God has provided excellent partners in each country of Mainland Asia*. Seed Company is blessed by their commitment to develop and maintain translation projects despite hostility from local governments. Work must be done in secret, security is high, and interrogation is a constant threat for many teams.

Yet translators remain motivated and willing to sacrifice their lives to translate Scripture. Several have become Bible translation consultants, mentoring and training other teams to help ensure that Scripture is clear and accurate.

With so many remaining needs in their region, yet faced with such opposition, Bible translation leaders in Mainland Asia need prayer for heavenly wisdom in order to reach the day when zero people in their region are without God's Word in their own language.

Regional Praise

Lockdowns Lifted in Mainland Asia

For three years, COVID-19 lockdowns in one area of Mainland Asia restricted local translators' ability to travel. They couldn't meet for mutual encouragement or check Scripture in communities for clarity. "We feel like birds in a cage," one project facilitator remarked. Thankfully, the lockdowns were recently lifted in that area! People in villages are equally delighted to start receiving the teams again.

Once the travel restrictions were lifted, 50 participants from various Bible translation organizations in the region were finally able to meet to discuss how to best collaborate going forward in a post-pandemic world.

- That the unity built by believers from these different organizations will hasten the day when Zero people in Mainland Asia are without Scripture.
- That God will protect translation teams as they resume travel.

PRAY FOR BIBLELESS PEOPLE GROUPS

Five Groups in Mainland Asia Receive First Scripture

Last October, Seed Company field staff and local church leaders celebrated the completion, recording, and distribution of dozens of oral Bible stories for five previously Bibleless people groups in a closed country. They also discussed how to reach this country's remaining Bibleless people and planned to begin with six more languages.

In January, they met with 25 people from these six groups for a planning session. But by the time they held the first workshop in March, 40 people came, representing *eight* language groups! Many had traveled 120+ miles over difficult terrain to get there. Praise God!

- That God will give wisdom to Seed Company and five new ministry partners as they supervise this new project.
- That God will help the participants stay strong in their faith even when persecuted.



Pray for the Mele* Cluster of Mainland Asia

The Ade* and Mele* people groups of the Mele <u>cluster project</u> often see themselves as alone and unknown. They believe they're under a curse that requires them to commit evil acts. Only a few hundred follow Jesus. But amid their spiritual darkness is a spark of hope, as <u>they're beginning to receive the first Scriptures in their language</u> after waiting a long time for translation.

PRAY FOR PARTNERS

Building Local Capacity in Mainland Asia

To build capacity for Bible translation work in a country hostile to Christianity, six two-week workshops were planned to train local translators and exegetical advisors (experts in interpreting Scripture). Nine translators, each from a different Bible translation project, attended the first workshop in March. Topics included steps of translation, history of the Bible, and linguistic terminology.

Praise God for the trainers willing to come to this country to equip these local translators and endure long hours traveling to and from the venue every day, eating local food, and experiencing hardships alongside them.

Pray for the Nap* People of Asia

A local militia exerts control over the Nap area and often forces one or two men from each household to join them. Drug trafficking is also a source of tension and conflict. Only about 10% of Nap people identify as Christians, but they enthusiastically receive and use every book of the Bible as it's translated. The Nap translation team has completed the New Testament and is working toward a complete Old Testament.

PRAY FOR AN ACTIVE TRANSLATION PROJECT The Ekisa* of Asia

The Ekisa project is providing the first Scripture for a people group in remote, wartorn parts of a country in Mainland Asia. We prayed for them back in October when they were just about to get started. So far, they're off to a great start in translating the New Testament thanks to a fine national partner, a translation advisor from an international organization, and local translators with a good grasp of English.

PRAISE

Ekisa team members made this observation about <u>Mark 1:16–20</u>: "This is a decision we must make once for all, but also every day of our lives. Jesus is telling us that knowing him, loving him, resembling him, and serving him must become the supreme passion of our lives. Everything else comes second." Praise God for their love for Jesus and passion for others to know him.


For good internet connections and the success of an important training session that started Monday and continues today and tomorrow.



Pray for the Rudu* People of Asia

Rudu people dwell in mountain villages along a mighty river. Fewer than 20% follow Christ, but as more Rudu Scripture becomes available, people are being delivered from drug and alcohol abuse and fear of spirits. The translation team is currently working on Mark, Acts, Luke, and James.

Pray for the Daleki* People of Asia

The Daleki Bible translation project is located in a region where persecution and government opposition are daily realities. Only about 0.5% of Daleki people follow Christ. But these few believers remain faithful.

A year after a security breach caused the Daleki project to be suspended, and Scripture drafts were confiscated and destroyed, a local translator wants to start again. So, we're getting her a computer!

Stories Like Their Grandparents Tell

In January, <u>we prayed for the Notibu* team</u>, who began an Oral Bible Storytelling project after completing the full Bible so they could more effectively engage their people. But they don't want to stop at their own country; they also plan to engage Notibu people in the diaspora!


Training materials have been successfully delivered to them on a USB drive. Team members have already decided on a list of eight Bible stories to start with. They're excited to learn how to tell Bible stories in a traditional Notibu way—"like our grandparents tell us stories."

Pray for the Way* People of Asia

Way people identify as Christians but are often influenced by animism. Many still offer sacrifices to appease ancestral spirits. In addition, political instability has jeopardized the wellbeing of their entire country. Many Way speakers have had to flee for their lives. In this difficult context, Bible translators continue to work on John's Gospel and other New Testament books.
